- plan and organise the range and mix of entertainment, attractions, amusement machines and fitness programs to be offered by the centre
- organise publicity to promote facilities and attract clients
- schedule games and competitions
- select, train and supervise staff
- ensure facilities are properly maintained and conform to safety standards
- may undertake coaching, fitness instruction and training of clients
- may plan and organise catering facilities
