Job description

Health care assistants support health care professionals provide patients with direct support and services in health and community centres as well as private residences. They are understanding and helpful with patients and able to perform a variety of functions and services.

What health care workers do

Health care workers support the services provided in hospitals, clinics, community and residential facilities. They work with health professionals in a wide range of roles for the safety and comfort of clients in their care.

Health care workers may have specialised training and skills for assisting in operating theatres or providing nursing support in acute care settings. They may also work alongside allied health professionals who provide therapeutic treatments such as physical therapy, speech therapy, radiography, dental hygiene, sonography, dietetics, prosthetics and many other health support services.

Aboriginal health workers provide flexible, holistic and culturally sensitive health services to Aboriginal clients and the community, to achieve better health outcomes and better access to health services for Aboriginal people and their communities.

A day in the life...

Work as a health care assistant may involve these tasks:

- help patients with their mobility and communication needs
- participate in planning the care needed for a patient
- follow therapy or care plans such as interventions to help those with dementia, physio or occupational therapy,
- observe and report changes in patients' condition
- assist with rehabilitation exercises, basic treatment and delivering medications
- create and facilitate culturally appropriate environments for Aboriginal people to receive health care
- develop, implement and evaluate Aboriginal specific health promotion programs within a multidisciplinary team
- provide direct support to therapists.
